In June, Anchor Academy and the Victor School, 2 other JRI schools, came to Granite Academy for a Math competition. Initiated by Granite Academy, the competition used a Jeopardy model that allowed for differentiation and a tiered system of progressively challenging problems and multiple topics within the Algebra 1 frame of study.

At Granite Academy, an elective was designed to prepare students. In weekly meetings they tested their skills against one another as they tackled algebra 1 topics. While all students were welcomed to enroll in the elective, a C average in their classes and a B average in their math class were needed to compete in the culminating competition.

At the event, our students worked together to tackle the problems and find solutions. As the clock ticked away, we found that we were neck in neck for the lead. At the end of the hour, teams from Granite Academy earned second and third place. With pride, they shook hands with the other students as they partook of the cupcakes and juice.

There were so many benefits from the event: students met other students of like interests, and abilities. They experienced how fun math can be

and developed confidence in their abilities. And they shared an important comraderie with their student teammates.

The following week, during the final mathletes elective, students provided feedback for improvements, and shared their enjoyment and hope that another competition can be held next year.

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Students Dig History at G.A.

In the third trimester, Granite Academy launched a fun, hands-on history elective called “Diggin’ History”. Each week, students researched the best metal detectors, how to use old maps, local history books, old newspapers and Google Earth to locate artifacts. On Friday afternoons we went off campus to do some prospecting.

Once items are discovered we look into the history of the item, researching how it was used and determine its significance to history.

The class focuses on teambuilding as well. One student might use the metal detector to find the item while another student digs it. Lastly, another student records the location, the item found and depth that it is found at.

We also focus on trash in our environment. Every item dug that is garbage is properly disposed of. Essentially, we are learning about science and history and cleaning up the environment at the same time.

Metal detecting connects to many parts of academics, whether it is the science that allows the process of oxidation that forms rust on an item or the reading of a passage about an event that ties to history.
